The October Speaker is Peter Lin

Hitching a Ride:

(part 1 of several snail odysseys) Susann Patton

He crawls closer and closer, his burden is heavy. Something is slowing him down from reaching his goal, which happens to be fresh tasty romaine lettuce. Can't resist that smell, but it is taking too much time and effort. He stops and reconsiders. Something is not right. Then he feels movement on his back. They touch antennas with instant repulsion. Now he knows and rolls his shell over knocking off the hitchhiker on his back. His speed picks up and he is moving at a rate of 1 inch a minute. Much faster than I thought a snail could travel. Several things about them have surprised me though. In this writing I will give you the results of the first experiment on snail evasion in my yard. I have written and have told people that copper is an effective physical barrier to keeping snails off of the orchids. The orchid flowers seem to have the same appeal as the romaine lettuce to snails. I have been criticized for not having tried out some of the remedies I have passed on to you and I am grateful for that feedback. So here goes. I am a basic scientist. And being a scientist I have used experiments many times to test out theories. In this case my helper (Ned) and I gathered up 35 snails in all sizes from my garden. We put this healthy group in an enclosed large glass terrarium. The only available food was placed in the middle of the terrarium, but within a solid copper humidity tray that had a lip of 1.5 inches high. We watched and waited. Two were moving straight toward the lettuce with steadfast determination. After dumping this hitch hiker our friend reached the copper lip first and started up the side. He got about half way up the side of the copper tray when he suddenly withdrew. After a moment he turned and left leaving a bubbly slime trail behind him. We were delighted, especially when the second snail had the exact same reaction. We marked both of these two, incase they got sick or died. Confident we really had something here we went to bed. The next morning however we found the lettuce mostly eaten and a half dozen snails just hanging out on the copper. The two we marked appeared to be just fine and no autopsy was needed. You can make up your own mind, but I am a lot *less confident* in the copper barrier. I will provide you with results of our next experiments and pass on what we find.

For your information on the copper it has been measured that the interaction between the snail's mucus and copper produces an electrical current that has been measured at 350mV. This is like putting your tongue on a 9V battery. There has been a lot of real science done on keeping the snails out of food crops. And many papers report success in repelling them. Tests include using wide bands of copper, copper wire, and copper bands with flanges that flare out as an extra barrier the snails have to fight; slowing them down a bit. They have studied new shiny copper and copper with patina (which my humidity trays do have). I will happily hook you up with how to get these papers if you let me know.

Orchid Tips: Susann Patton

DNA Research Finds Surprise Connection. Orchids are among the most colorful and complex, even bizarre, members of the plant world. For biologists, they are among the most challenging as it has been difficult to place them in their plant family tree and identify their closest relatives. However, new research from New York, using DNA technology, suggests they are more closely related to... wait for it the asparagus family, than to other plant groups. Well, I have often thought of the inflorescences as being as tender as asparagus tips when I accidentally break them off time and again (and then mutter a few bad words).

Wine Corks: For those of you who accumulate wine corks, keep in mind that they can be broken up and added to the potting mix you use. I have the word that the plants love the corks, maybe it's the all in the wine. Marla has glued corks cut in half on a board and grown mounted orchids on these corks. Again they did seem to do well and it made a great presentation. She will be happy to share her method.
