checklist for March/Apri/

Cattleya

- Yellowing sheaths trap moisture and
- can lead to bud rot. Carefully remove the sheath so the bud can develop, these may need support. Very bright days can cause sunburn.
- More water and fertilizer
- Immediately after blooming repot winter and spring-flowering cattleyas

Cymbidium

- **ALERT:** aphids, slugs and snails.
- More water and increase nitrogen level in fertilizer

Lycaste

- Repot if new growth has appeared.
- Fertilize and water

Miltoniopsis

- Cleaning off the older yellow foliage.

Paphiopedilum

- Increasing light levels to encourage spikes
- stake after the flower has hardened

Phalaenopsis

- **ALERT:** Mealy bugs and scales. The signs are sooty mold.
- As the days lengthen the plant will need more water.

Some basic thoughts on Bulbophyllums

My introduction to Bulbophyllum Orchids (Bulbos) started when one of our members brought in a very elegant flower, orange in color, fairly good sized (if I remember around 8” or more) with an elastically articulated column on it. But what really cemented it in my memory was its smell. My friend said, “go get close and get a good smell”. Rotten flesh. I don’t mean similar, I mean the real rotten stuff and that is why I remember it so distinctively. We remember the colors and textures of our favorite flowers easily enough, but scent bypasses our higher reasoning brain and goes directly to our emotional brain where when we smell that same smell again all of the emotions, time and place of the first smell returns. I didn’t need to be told that this is not a flower - no matter how beautiful - to have inside a home. There are

Bulbos. that get quite large with flowers that smell of rotten infested meat with flowers that actually look like maggots eating rotten meat (Bulbo. Phalaenopsis). But there are many orchids with this technique of reproduction, not just Bulbos. They use flies to pollinate, just like other sweeter smelling orchids are pollinated by moths which are attracted by the evening-scented flowers. Bulbophyllums have other scents as well, Bulbo. cocoinum small flowers smelling like coconuts and Bulbo. ambrosia smells likes honey and Bulbo. rothschildianum smells of peaches, just to name a few. No more comment needed on this tract, its just that my first introduction to Bulbos was mainly by scent.

Bulbos are a very diverse group of over 3000 species, mainly from India, Nepal, East through Southeast Asia, Japan, China, and the Philippines. They are also naturally occurring in the tropical parts of Australia and Africa with over 135 species that have been discovered on just Madagascar. It is one of the largest genus’ in the entire orchid family and as you may be able to tell they have the largest diversity.

Unfortunately this is why it is impossible to provide any but general Bulbo. orchid care. So I give some generalities. They are generally found in the tropics, but may be found in temperate zones. Most species are epiphytes, but a few are lithophytes and from what I have read these that grow on rocks can be for more advanced growers. Some are bare root growers, creeping closely up the trunks of trees; while others are tall and have more conical shaped pseudobulbs and flower stems that stand upright. Some are leafless, using the pseudobulbs for photosynthesizing. I look in by favorite reference book ‘Botanica’s Orchids’ and I find again that generally speaking Bulbos. species with close growing pseudobulbs grow shallow roots and should be grown in shallow containers with good drainage, yet able to hold adequate moisture. Those species that have widely spaced pseudobulbs can be grown in hanging baskets or mounted on slabs. My reference goes on to say that high humidity, some warmth and shade with good light is needed. Here is what most of that means: Bulbos. are generally water lovers, so if they are mounted, they can take a watering twice a day. If potted, every 3-4 days with a slight drying out between waterings will keep them happy. If plants are not watered enough, the new leaf will be smaller than the previous one. Natural humidity level of 60 percent is good, so anything from 60 to 100 percent will benefit them. If they are in pots, use a larger, shallow pot and fine seedling bark mixed with perlite. Using a clay pot and letting them grow will soon result in a specimen ball. This is pretty vague I must admit so my best advice will be follow detailed information about the Bulbo. species or hybrid you are interested in. There are many diverse flowers in this group, so when our expert is here be sure to query him about your plants’ culture. Many of these plants are called easy growers, so don’t pass up on them because they may not be what you usually see for sale by our vendors at the Show. Enjoy.

Welcome New Members


Please warmly welcome our newest members. It is up to us, as a society to make all new members feel welcome.
