Our Speaker this month is . . .

Fred Clark, of Sunset Valley Orchids. Fred is a professional grower with more than 24 years experience and involved in very sophisticated hybridizing. He is known, among other things, for producing the "closest flower color to black ever witnessed," Fredclarkeara After Dark, Catasetum is the name of this beauty.

This month, Fred's visit to the Southbay Orchid Society, will focus on successfully growing bulbophyllums (bulb-oh-FILL-lum). Although, in recent months we've had a speaker of bulbophyllums, Fred Clark will illuminate the subject in a different and equally interesting manner. Fred is the leading bulbophyllum expert on the West coast, we will learn about his successful growing techniques in our climate.

Bulbophyllums are of interest for many reasons, one being that they are one of largest genus in the orchid family. Secondly, they are of interest to orchid grower because of their unudual forms and colors of the flowers. Although we don't find them at the local Home Depot or Trader Joe's, these orchids are companion plants to phalaenopsis because they thrive under the similar conditions. Hence, those of us who grow phals can welcome to or collection a bulbophyllum and add diversity to our orchid collection.

Fred will bring some plants for our plant table. These are rare so don't miss the opportunity to add to your collection-come to this month's meeting, moved to May 23.

South Bay Orchid Society 2008 – 2009 Board of Directors Nominees

The following nominees are recommended by the Board of Directors Nominating Committee for open director positions. Basic selection considerations were:

- 1. Either previous performance or a demonstrated aptitude to execute the responsibilities.
- 2. Character to complement the board and work well with existing board members.
- 3. Computer literacy as the board frequently communicates and/or conducts business via email with the use of a number of software programs.

The Board of Directors consists of 12 positions of which at least 9 must be filled in order to conduct business. We will be voting on 5 positions. Additionally, three directors are voted in every two years, three positions are appointed, and the Past President position is automatic. Following are the positions which we will be voting on for our next fiscal year during our May general meeting:

Treasurer – Jim Rowley

Jim has been our treasurer for several years and has provided us with excellent and accurate work. He is best suited for this position as this is also his profession.

Secretary – Polly Kinsinger

Polly is our current Secretary and has done an outstanding job of recording the Society's business during board meetings. Her results are always clear, concise, and punctual.

2nd Vice President – Peggy Worthington

The 2nd Vice President is responsible for our annual social functions which include the Installation Banquet, Holiday Party, Santa Barbara Bus Trip, and our annual picnic. Peggy will be new to the Board. She has been working toward her horticultural certificate at UCLA and teaches "Successful Gardening," courses at the Gardens. By profession, she works in document management and has a computer background. She is well-suited to the task as she is experienced in managing details.

1st Vice President – Susan Amini

The 1st Vice President arranges for our general meeting speakers, the plant table (often provided by the speaker), and the culture session speaker. Susan will also be new to the Board. She became interested in orchids 11 years ago and currently belongs to four orchid societies. Frequently, local societies will coordinate arranging out-of-town speakers. With Susan's membership in three other societies she will have an advantage in this area. As this position is considered the first voice of our Society within AOS affiliate societies, Susan will be an excellent ambassador for the South Bay Orchid Society.

President

At this time we have not found a willing member who meets the criteria. As the Board of Directors only needs to maintain 9 members, this vacancy would leave the Board with 11 members. The President's position is primarily managerial in nature. The Society will still be able to conduct both general meetings and board meetings without issue. The Society's By-Laws allow for the filling of vacancies by the Board of Directors. It is the committee's recommendation that the position remain open until such time as the newly elected board can elect a suitable member.

Watering

Not too long ago a speaker at SBOS showed us his drenching technique. I recall vividly the Vandas and the change in the color of their roots as he repeatedly drenched them. Now that the season in getting hotter our orchid plants will benefit from frequent and judicious watering, especially mounted plants such as vandas, asconcendas, and cattleyas.

Drenching Technique and Scheduling

It is commonly agreed the best technique for watering orchid plants is giving them a "once over lightly" and then waiting 5-10 minutes and watering once again. This allows the velamen (white epidermal covering on the roots) to become absorbent. This technique is helpful both for mounted orchids as well as potted plants. The potted plants and mounted ones benefit from this double drenching technique because it allows harmful salts, dust or loose vegetative matter to wash off. If we allow the salts and dust and loose matter to remain we create a fertile ground for algae and pathogens that will be harmful for the plants.

Orchid roots let you know when they have enough water. Phal leaves will become elongated, and oncidiums and cymbidiums leaves will come out accordion shaped and wrinkled when underwatered. In Vandas, for example, look for green roots with water droplets clinging to the roots a few minutes after watering. If you don't see water droplets, give water one more time. In dire cases, if the plants are looking water stressed, soak it for 10 to 30 minutes in a bucket of water to rehydrate the roots. Root rot will signal overwatering.

Water first in the morning before the temperature rises to help the plant resist harful drying, this also allows for healthy drying to deter the growth of pathogens. The second drenching should be no later than 3:30, to avoid wet leaf axils.

Signs of Under-watering

If the velamen takes as long on subsequent watering to turn green as it did on the first day, or the roots are long and beadlike the interval between watering is too long. If the lower leaves on vandas and asconcendas fall off this too may indicate not enough watering.

Caveat: be sure the surface water on your plants dries within 3 hours, if the drenching is successful the roots will retain water even if the surface appears dry. This is crucial to avoid the growth of harmful fungi.

Helpful Tip for the Month

Melquist's Law: plants that bloom at an early age are most likely to be free-blooming throughout their life. Application: when choosing plants among siblings choose the biggest ones because these have displayed greater vigor and will be easier to grow. These are likely to bloom earlier and have larger and more numerous flowers than their siblings.

Best Location in the Greenhouse/habitat for Your Vandas and Asctm.'s

V. dearei and its hybrids are sensitive to cold and require the warmest spot in the greenhouse or growing environment.

Arachnis and *Papilionanthe* and their hybrids require the most light and heat they can get so they can bloom

Ascocentrum ampullaceum and Asctm. Curvifolium require some coolness to start blooming and should be moved to cool location about a month before blooming.
