In Search of Dendrobium Speciosum

This is not an article on D spec but a story of my journey with this plant. A treatise of this magnificent plant would require description of the 6 to 8 varieties (they are dividing and subdividing) their locations on the Au Continent, growth, flowering habits etc etc. I would need to do some research to do justice bur am writing this article on short notice.

The Aussies think this is the greatest of all orchids. It has been said that if people bred other orchids for anther 50 years they might develop a plant as grand, beautiful and majestic as a great speciosum. They affectionately refer to them as "Rock Lillies"

I got my first one in 1996, a 5 cane specimen for \$50. It bloomed 2 years later and now has 32 canes many of them 2 1/2 feet long. Maximum bloom has been 16 spikes with 50 to 75 flowers per spike. I met George Kenner from San Diego who specialized in these plants and got an example of each of the 6 varieties recognized at that time. I also purchased a couple of hybrids from him, one being D spec 'Daylight Moon' FCC/AUS x Neville. This stimulated my interest in awarded speciosums but getting a division of Daylight Moon then was like trying to buy a Panda Bear from the Chinese. I tried for a while to get these famous clones but gave up as they were very seldom available and then only at astronomical prices.

Things appear to have change a bit and my interest has reawakened. This year I found divisions of D spec 'Windermere' HCC/AUS, a deep rich yellow flower for \$70 per cane and D spec 'Daylight Moon' FCC/AUS a white flower, probably the most famous of these plants for \$180 per cane. These 2 plants appear over and over in hybrid crosses. This may seem expensive but is reasonable compared to what they were asking for these things in the past. With due diligence maybe more of the famous plants will become available. With the cooperation and help of a fellow member of our little group, these plants have become reality.

The other thing I have ventured into is the purchase of hybrid seedlings of these famous plants. I have resisted this in the past as with seedlings, you don't really know what you are getting but have come around to the realization that in my lifetime I will probably not get too many more of these great plants so why not take a crap shoot and see what comes up.

I have purchased 28 seedlings with famous parentage for an average price of \$8.70, including transportation. They are sold by a couple of Aussie nurseries for \$6 to \$8 a plant, add 10% for transportation. They take care of all the paper-

work, the plant is delivered to your door by the mail man. I will bring a few samples to this meeting so you can see how big a plant we are talking about. I estimate 5 to 7 years to bloom. Since the price is low enough, I think I will eventually end up with 100 of them. Like they say, if you throw enough against the wall, some will stick. I assume that some of them will produce outstanding specimens, the others will still be blooming sized D speciosums that are easily worth \$100 each so some of the outlay can be recaptured.

If any of you have questions about this please let me know, I will gladly share what I have learned about this. When Ahnold learned that a \$6 seedling turns into a \$100 plant he said the State of California will get a bunch to hedge against future budget shortfalls.

To Cut or Not to Cut- that is the question

Ever since my first orchid, an unfortunate Phalaenopsis purchased from a grower, I've been haunted by the question of how to cut the Phal spike so it continues to flower. Through the course of many years, and many plants (may they rest in peace) and cutting many spikes after the first bloom to never see another bloom, I came to the conclusion the practice of cutting the spike to trick the plant into another bloom was a myth. Last year, I stopped trying. Sure enough at around the same time I purchased a phal from one of our orchid shows and it bloomed consecutively for five months!

My conclusion at that time: buy phals that naturally bloom sequentially. Phew! Why didn't I figure that out sooner?! However, for those adventurous by nature who wish to experiment much can be found about spike cutting.

Many growers believe it is best to leave the plant to do as it is meant by nature. The plant may grow a new spike from the node on the old spike or bloom again from the old spike! For example, Phalaenopsis modesta is a plant that will bloom again from an old spike as well as form new spikes. Hence, the spike on this species as well as the miniature Doritis pucherrima x Phal. Decumbens and Phal. Nancy Gordon Daves should never be cut as you can have several years of spikes continue blooming.

For large standard pink or white flowering phals, on the other can, you should cut the spike at the base once it has no flowers. This will allow the plant to save energy for its next phase of growth.

Some have successfully used a cut spike to produce a keiki. Apparently, a reasonable method seems to be to apply Superthrive in a bucket and cut the spike under the water of this solution. The spike may keiki. Keiki Grow, a commercial product can also be used to induce a keiki or flowering. You must, however, be very patient since it will take many months to see results.

A third approach is to cut the spike 3/4 of the way above the third node from the bottom, this will encourage the plant to grow another spike from one of the remaining spikes.

Thus the answer to question of whether to cut or not: it depends on the plant.

Simple Tips to Follow with Your Cattleyas

If your cattleya bloomed in the winter or spring, it will require a 6-8 week rest period. Water only once a week. However, if your cattleya blooms in the summer, no rest period is required. You can fertilize cattleyas with 20-20-20 every other week. If in bloom please use a higher nitrogen product such as 30-10-10.

Cattleyas benefit from moisture and need plenty of moisture to develop healthy pseudopods. Twice a week during growth period is good. Do not let the roots sit in water because they will develop root rot. During the summer they will benefit from the use of a humidity tray or a shallow dish with water. Place pebbles on the bottom to ensure the plant does not sit in water. Follow these simple suggestions and you will enjoy the growth of these hearty orchids.

19th World Orchid Conference — Krull-Smith Display

As the Spring ends and Summer begins:

- Repot cymbidiums, dendrobiums, ondontoglossoms, oncidiums, paphs and phrags
- Look for blooms in cattleya, epidendrum, vandal, catasetum, miltonia and encyclia
- Fertilize twice the winter rate.
- Increase watering
- You move your inside plants outside. Phals and Catts require bright light but not direct sun. Vandas and epidendrums can stand direct light but be sure they are not positioned so that the noon sun can cause sunburn. A sign of sunburn is a black spot on the leaves.
- With increases watering is the possibility of fungus growth, examine your plants for signs of brown/black rings on the leaves or roots.
- Check for pests.

- -require plenty of light, about 30 % full sun in the greenhouse
- -do not let them dry out
- -ideal temperature range is 55-85 degree F.
- -fertilize every week at 1/4 recommended dilution with 10-10-10 or 12-12-12
- repot every one to two years before the mixture starts to break down.

Helpful Tip for the Month

Epsom Salt: Magnesium is critical for bloom initiation for this reason some growers recommend watering with Epsom salts (magnesium sulfate) especially if you are watering with water processed through reverse osmosis. If your commercial fertilizer already contains these ingredients some still use the Epsom salts. Jim Kawaski recommends watering phals with a 1 teas- to-quart of water in August to help initiate the blooming cycle for two to three waterings.

Other growers sprinkle the granules on the top of the plants and allow the magnesium sulfate to be watered in. Magnesium sulfate is water soluble and any excess amounts will be flushed.

Experiments show that seedlings given the treatment above, will grow much bigger and flower at least one year sooner than siblings not provided with Epsom salt treatment.

Additional expert recommendations:

- 1/2 teasp. to one gallon every watering
- If watering once a week, then 1 tbs/gal
