NEW THOUGHTS ON WATERING BARE ROOT PLANTS DURING THE HOT TIME OF THE YEAR

I have always held to the dictum: Water potted plants once a week, bare-root plants once a day unless conditions warrant otherwise. Just a few examples of varying from the standard routine: if the pots are unusually small or large, if the temp is unusually high or low, if there is a lot of morning fog (June gloom) or if the season (Winter, Santa Ana Winds, Yukon Express) commands otherwise. During extreme heat I would, in the past, try to water twice, morning and night.

This year I have had extra time on my hands, and spent a few more days at home every week scratching whatever needs scratching and wondering what to do with the rest of my time. When we had these unusual heat waves this year I altered my watering routines and watered more often. I also increased my scratching routine but I don't believe that affected the plants.

First of all, let me specify what I mean by watering. It relates to bare root plants only (none of this has any application to potted plants) which I WATER once or twice a week, meaning, I spray them to get the roots wet and then immediately afterward water them thoroughly with fertilizer water. That routine I did not alter. What I did alter is my habit of HOSING them down with unaltered water similar to hosing down a driveway, which I do at least once or twice daily. For the rest of this article I only refer to the later.

During the first unusual heat wave this spring I hosed them off three, four, and occasionally five times a day including once after sunset so they would stay wet longer. I remember hearing about Orchids of Los Osos, or the other Orchid Nursery up there, having a Vanda room with automated sprinklers which went on every 30 minutes for 5 seconds with a sprayer for every plant. This was supposed to have resulted in phenomenal growth. I never had it confirmed whether that story is true but it sounds plausible as long as there is enough heat to dry the roots between waterings. This year I tried to apply the same principle, water them, and water them again when the roots had been totally dry for a while. When the temp hits 98F, which it did in my backyard more than once this spring, this happens pretty fast.

Sometimes later this spring I noticed unusual thickness of new Cattleya growth and related this to the unusual watering (hosing down that is) frequency. I therefore continued numerous hosings daily even after the extreme heat passed. We had a couple of more heat waves with three to five hosings daily, but on a normal temperature day I now try to hose them off at least twice and often three times per day. This is obviously way too much water for plants in moss or plants with a very dense root ball which acts like bark by the sheer numbers of the roots, but I have not noticed damage so far in plants of that nature.

On many, but not all of the Cattleyas, the thickness of the new growth is remarkably greater than previous bulbs. I know how to differentiate from the normal maturing of plants and the associated increase in pbulp size, but am referring to plants which had established an unchanging growth pattern for the last few years and this year produced noticeably thicker pbulbs. I don't know if this relates to: 1) More frequent watering 2) Decidedly higher temperatures 3) More sunlight with less fog this spring (almost no 'June Gloom').

The biggest factor may well have been the absence of the usual 'June Gloom' this year. The same plants bloom and grow new shoots at the same time every year so the ones usually growing at this time of the year did so in glorious sunlight. That could well be the difference rather than my brilliant watering technique.

It is however possible that during periods of heat, one should water bare root plants much more often than I have thought necessary in the past. I would like to hear if others had a similar experience this year. "Ahnold" claims I gave them steroids but I categorically deny this and am willing to submit urine samples of the top performers. I also vehemently, with near 100% certainty, deny having a recollection of ever groping Orchids.

Remove — Revitalize — Repot Workshop

On July 26th we had our first "Hands-On Repotting Workshop" held at the South Coast Botanic Garden. We had expected 20 to 30 people. But as Gomer Pyle would say, **Surprise! Surprise! Surprise!** 70 showed up. 3/4 of the participants did not belong to any orchid society. One person said that this would be her first orchid ever. It was a great day of dispelling the notion that orchids are difficult. A typical refrain was "I can do this!"

We provided everything; plants, pots, bark, newspaper, gloves—the works. We started them off right. Before anyone touched an orchid the gloves went on. I spent the next two hours standing on a stool barking (a little orchid humor) information and instructions. At one point,



Nick Braemer told a story of his visit to a grower some years back. The man told Nick "Here's all you need to know about growing orchids, young fella. Water them once a week. Fertilize every two weeks at half strength. Give them as much light as you can, but keep them out of the sun. Repot every two years. 80% will love ya, the other 20% you don't want anyway." This story gets across that orchids don't deserve the reputation they have.



Nick Braemer as we hosted a packed house that divided and repotted 70 orchids in 90 minutes. There were numerous other members that showed up to help out and learn. Participants didn't always get it right the first time and they had to dump it out and start over. Very quickly they got the idea of how to handle orchids, their roots (good and bad), packing bark, etc. It was a madhouse of fun. We sent them all home with at least three growths per pot and all back bulbs were cleaned.




The inspiration for this repotting workshop came from a conversation I had with Susann

Patton shortly before she passed away. Susann loved orchids, the Society, and teaching people how to successfully grow them. Susann and I conspired on having a hands-on workshop where people would be guided by experts from the Society. When you're new to orchids, it's one thing to watch a demonstration and it's something entirely different to repot one yourself and to do it correctly. Susann graciously do-

nated her entire collection of cymbidiums for this workshop.

After it was all over and just three of us remained, Tom, Marla, and myself, we looked at each other and agreed that if Susann were looking down upon what just took place . . . she would be smiling. The success of this hands-on workshop was so grand that we've already scheduled our next one. Thank you Susann.
