Growing Moisture Loving Plants in Standing Water

Bill Thoms talked to us about Bulbos some time ago. He made mention of the fact that he grows them in shallow trays of water with great results. My warm greenhouse got completed three months ago and I started growing the Bulbos that way. Four weeks ago the cold GH was completed and I am now growing the water loving rain forest plants the same way. This includes the Draculas, Masdevallias, Pleurothallus, Restrepas, Lepanthes, some Maxillarias etc, etc. The Draculas and other bottom bloomers have to be inspected at regular intervals for emerging flower spikes.

The Bulbos showed good growth, which was not surprising as, according to Bill Thoms, they should. I can now say with confidence that the rain forest plants from Central and South America also seem to love it. I can only compare the current growth to my previous effort, which in itself does not prove anything; however, I'm impressed with the across the board excellent new growth. Lots of new leaves, new roots, and no evidence of harm.

They are sitting in 1/2" of water in cookie trays. All are in moss, which is fairly wet as it sops up the water. The Bulbos get regular tap water, they are animals that will live in your toilet; the rain forest plants on the other hand are sensitive queens who get RO water which is bumped up to a between 150 and 200 ppm with fertilizer and nutrients like Sea Weed Extract. The ppm of my tap water is around 300, I bump it up to 500. I surface mist them daily, which is probably not necessary but satisfies the co-dependency relationship I have with the Chids. Evaporation dries out the trays in 2 to 3 days so they need to be kept at the right level. Some plants are in baskets which elevates the plants from the base of the trays,

they get 1" or more water so the bottom of the moss is in water. Every two weeks or so I get to clean out each tray as debris seems to accumulate.

Marnie Turkel does not grow her plants that way, which says something, as I respect her growing ability. My growing ability does not match hers, this way may be superior to my usual growing skills, as there usually are days when I don't water. When I visit my son in Redding it may be 2 to 3 days between drinks. At least the rain forest plants don't appreciate a dry spell of that duration. With this method they are never dry. Cattleyas and Dendrobiums are examples of plants who would not do well in this constant moisture.

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I'm slowly expanding the number of plants I'm trying in this, AU terrestrials, Gongoras, Pescatore, Bolleas and others are slowly being introduced to living in a cookie sheet with 1/2" of water. There are three plants though that suggest to me that this method might work for many plants. A Maxillaria, a Coelogeny and a Liparis have almost as many new growths as they have old bulbs. Seven new growths on eight old bulbs is not what I'm used to, maybe some of you get results like that but I usually don't. The jury is still out on some of them but maybe others could try this method and report.

When I got into this and I bought cookie sheet after cookie sheet, the local supermarket check-out queen thought I became a Girl Scout troop master and was suspicious of my motives. Ahnuld vouched that I was not a sex offender and I was allowed to buy more cookie sheets. What a guy, I'm going to miss him!

A New Kind of Dendrobium Nobile

I recently purchased Dendrobium Dream 'Ace'. A bushy plant in a basket cascading over the sides and also standing erect. It's a 'nobile', although I would have never guessed. I was told that as a result of hybridizing and crossing with crosses, this plant does not need a dry, cool winter rest and will bloom at least twice a year. Water it year-round, expect blooms around Mother's Day or soon after and one more time per year. Certainly different from the usual D nobile that I'm familiar with.

I was told that this is a 'Yamamoto cross'. Check them out (in Hawaii) at <http://www.yamamotodendrobiums.com/> They specialize in D nobiles and have developed these plants that have larger, longer lasting flowers and do not need the cold dry winter rest. I also was told that they are easier to grow with more predictable results, and that some will bloom more than once a year.

I contacted them and was told that my plant is NOT one of their clones but that they have a number of plants with the characteristics I described above. They suggested the following:

Himezakura 'Sanokku'; Spring Dream 'Apollon'; Spring Dream 'Kumiko'; Sea Mary 'Snow King'; Country Girl 'Murasuzume'; Spring Bird 'Kurashiki'; Fancy Angel 'Lycee'.

I have never been too lucky with D nobiles, I can make them grow but they don't look nearly as good as they should. I'm going to give these a try. Ahnuld said he'd also try them. Soon he'll have lots of time on his hands unless they finally pass a constitutional amendment or accept the fact that he was also born in Kenya.
